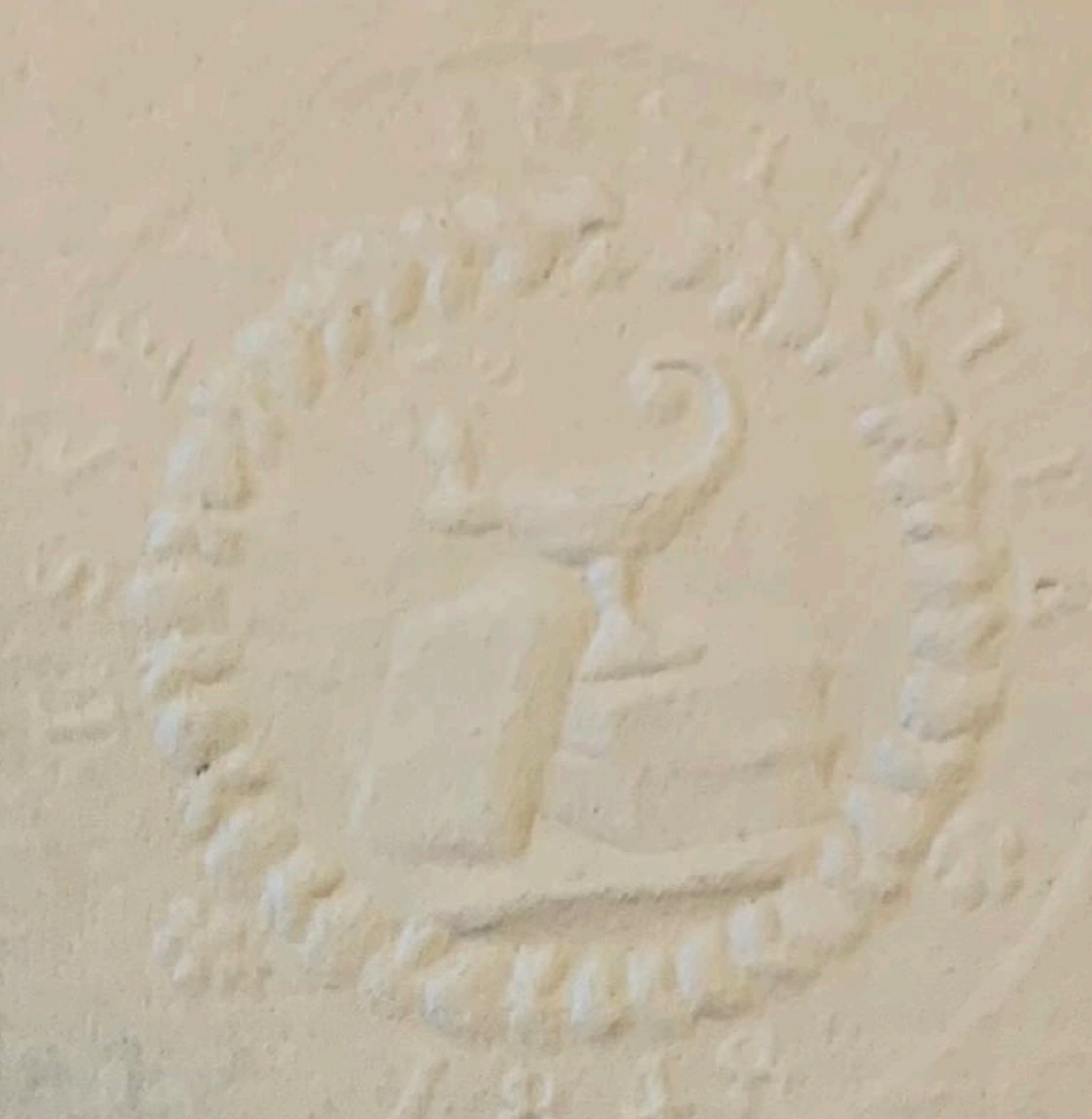

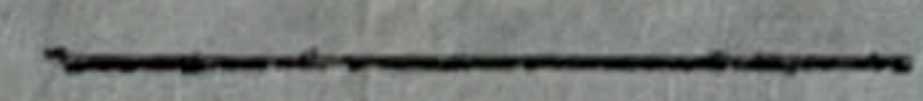

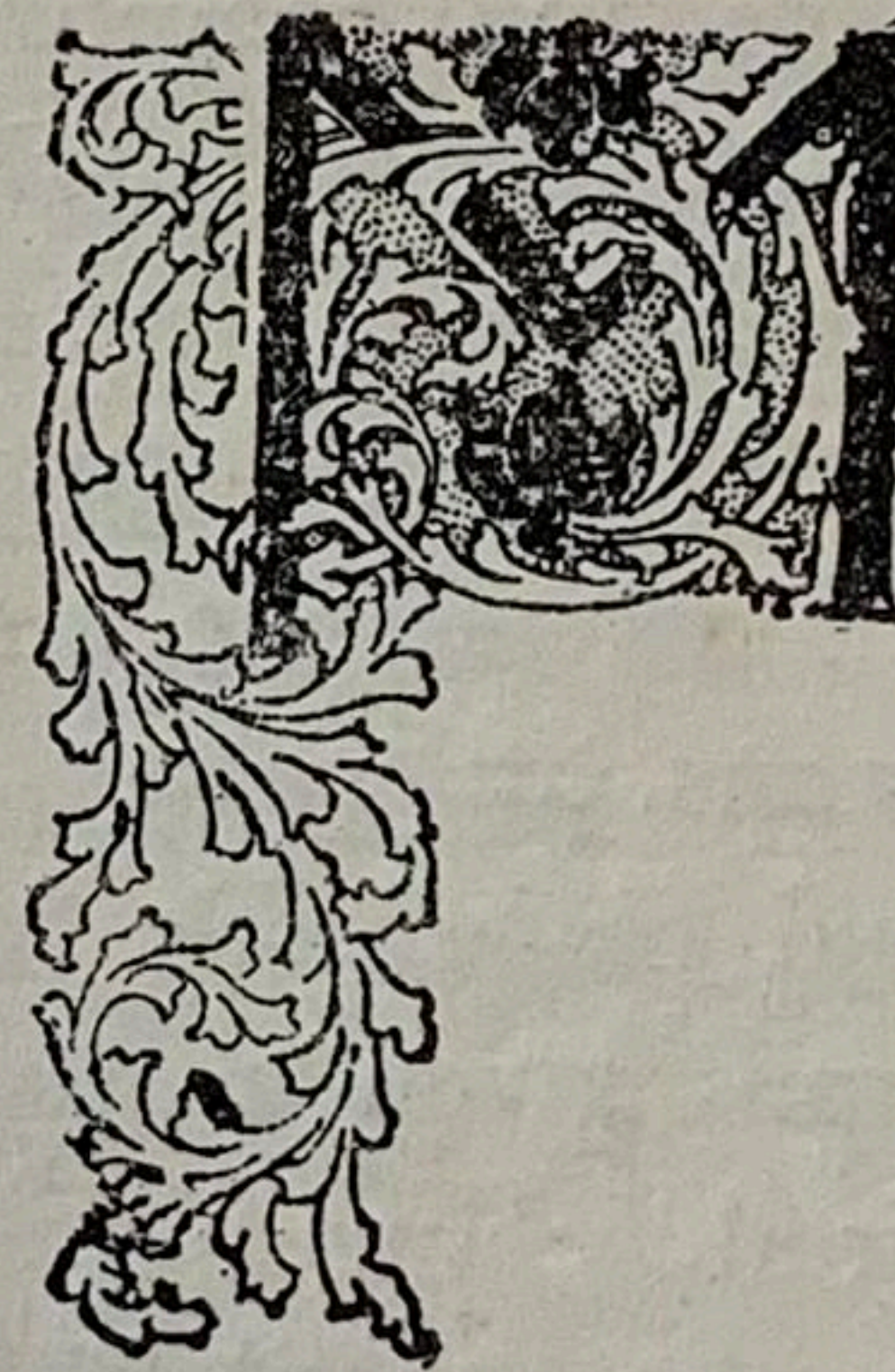

MRS. DAVIS will re-open the Hamilton Hall School, SEPTEMBER 28, 1898, under her own management. The work is conducted on the principles pursued in the public schools. In the Primary Department the Froebelian spirit prevails, and aims to develop the child according to the best methods of modern education.

A continuity is preserved throughout the entire course. The habits of mind established here enable the pupils to make more rapid progress in their future work. Each class is under Mrs.

Davis' own supervision and all pupils are instructed by her in one or more studies. The language and compositions throughout the school are taught and corrected by Mrs. Davis. It is requested that pupils will be regular and punctual in their attendance and have few excused lessons, otherwise the school cannot be held responsible for their progress. Pupils given a High School course if desired.

Pupils admitted to the school from five years of age and upward.

It is thought best that boys should enter the High School or some Preparatory School when the Grammar School course is completed.

TERMS PER SCHOOL YEAR.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT, covering four years of work, if the pupil enters at five years of age, - - - \$60.00.

GRAMMAR DEPARTMENT, covering four years more of work and preparing pupils for entrance to High School, with one language, German, \$75.00.

With two languages, German and French, also Latin begun the last two years, - - - - \$100.00.

HIGH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT, covering four years of work and preparing pupils for entrance to college, \$150.00 to \$200.00.

Stationery furnished free of charge. Also books for lowest grades. Books for higher grades to be charged to pupils.

Terms payable half yearly in advance,

October 1st and January 1st. The lessons in Manual Training are given Friday afternoons. Terms \$15.00 for 20 lessons.
